AMERICAN SPIRITUAL

"Follow the Drinking Gourd," was used by an Underground Railroad operative to encode escape instructions and a map. These directions then enabled fleeing slaves to make their way North from Mobile, Alabama, to the Ohio River and freedom. Taken at face

value, the "drinking gourd" refers to the hollowed-out gourd used by slaves and other rural Americans as a water dipper, but here it is used as a code name for the Big Dipper star formation, which points to Polaris, the North Star.

In the ensuing 95 years, the song played an important role in the Civil Rights and folk revival movements of the 1950s and 1960s. Much of its enduring appeal derives from its perceived status as a unique, historical remnant harkening back to the pre-Civil War South—no other such map songs survive.
